TOP THINGS TO SEE

The city of Love, where Romeo & Juliet fell in love. A city full of history and art you'll enjoy at its best while walking around the streets, surrounded by ancient palaces and Roman ruins.

Arena di Verona

The Roman amphitheater is the 3rd biggest of the world but the best preserved and still used for the Opera Festival and live concerts.

Ponte Pietra

The most ancient bridge of the city is also one of the best spots for a stunning view of Verona, especially at night. Cross it to reach the Roman Theater.

Piazza Erbe

The favorite square of the city is bustling of life especially during Aperitivo, the Italian happy hour. A lot of festival and events all year round use it as a stunning setting.

Castel San Pietro

Climb the steps that lead on the hill and reach Castel San Pietro for a beautiful panoramic spot over the whole city. Go there at sunset or sunrise to see it at its best.

Juliet's House

You can visit the house of the Shakespearean heroine and play being her on the iconic balcony or leave a love message on the walls at the entrance.

Teatro Romano

So well preserved that, as for the Arena, is still used for shows. Concerts, theater plays, the Shakespeare Festival are held here every summer.

Piazza dei Signori

Next to Piazza Erbe, this square is a little jewel. The Christmas Market takes place here in Nov.-Dec. creating a special atmosphere while the square comes alive.

Castelvecchio

Explore the gardens of the castle and visit the museum to enjoy the building interiors. Cross the bridge for a beautiful view of the city on the river side.
